Emalahleni, Mpumalanga - Every May 1st, South Africa pauses to honour the unwavering dedication of its working-class citizens.

Meanwhile, the South African Federation of Trade Unions (SAFTU) raised concerns about the recent petrol price increase, coinciding with Workers' Day.

SAFTU leader Mosima Maredi condemned the government's decision, citing its impact on workers already grappling with meagre salary increases and rising living costs.

Maredi also highlighted the plight of vacant teaching positions in Limpopo, attributing it to ongoing budget cuts.

As South Africa reflects on 30 years of freedom on International Workers' Day, the celebrations are tempered by the realities of unemployment, economic challenges, and the ongoing struggle for social justice.

Amidst the festivities, calls for meaningful change resonate, echoing the spirit of resilience and solidarity that defines the nation's labour movement.

**Union Buildings, Tswane -** President Cyril Ramaphosa delivered a profoundly moving address at the Union Buildings in Tshwane on Saturday, commemorating the 30th anniversary of Freedom Day.

His words resonated with hope, reflecting on the historic significance of April 27, 1994, when South Africa embraced democracy after decades of apartheid rule.

#### **ACTIONSA PROTESTS FREEDOM DAY CELEBRATIONS**

**Mbombela, Mpumalanga -** Thoko Mashiane, the Premier Candidate for ActionSA in Mpumalanga, announced on Saturday that the party will not be participating in Freedom Day celebrations in the province.

The party also drew attention to the dire living conditions faced by residents, including months-long water shortages in eMalahleni and the persistent use of pit toilets in communities like Charles Celliers.

#### IMBIZO FOCUSED ON COLLABORATION BETWEEN SAPS AND RESIDENTS TO COMBAT CRIME

**Tzaneen, Limpopo** - In an Imbizo last Friday, community members in and around Lenyenye, which is under the Maake policing area, were brought together by SAPS management and Deputy Minister of Police, Mr Cassel Mathale (MP), to strengthen partnerships for safer neighbourhoods.

Colonel Malesela Ledwaba underlined in a press release that the event, which was attended by a wide range of stakeholders such as the MEC for Transport and Community Safety, Ms. F. Zweli Luthuli echoed similar concerns, indicating the impact of corruption on the country's youth.

We are suffering due to the greed of those in power. Despite being free from racism, unemployment plagues our youth, casting a shadow over the promise of a better future."

Bongiwe Mokoena raised issues of economic exploitation and political disillusionment, lamenting the lack of effective governance.

"In Emalahleni, we are rich in resources, yet foreigners benefit while our people

The ANC is divided, and alternative political parties offer little clarity, leaving us feeling lost."

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#### TRAGIC HEAD-ON COLLISION ON **N4 TOLL ROAD - FOUR LIVES LOST**

Belfast, Mpumalanga - In a tragic turn of events, the N4 toll road near Belfast in Mpumalanga became the scene of a devastating head-on collision between a Volkswagen Polo and a Chevrolet light delivery vehicle, resulting in the loss of four lives and leaving several others seriously injured.

The incident has prompted an urgent plea from Acting MEC Busisiwe Shiba of the Mpumalanga Community Safety, Security, and Liaison department, urging motorists to adhere strictly to road rules to prevent further deadly crashes.

The fatal collision occurred on Saturday night, April 27, on the N4 toll road in Wonderfontein near Belfast.

According to Moeti Mmusi, spokesperson for Community Safety, Security, and Liaison, the collision claimed the lives of three males and one female, all of whom perished at the scene.

Additionally, three individuals sustained serious injuries, with two occupants of the LMV and one from the LDV currently receiving treatment at a nearby hospital in Belfast.

While the exact cause of the crash remains under investigation, preliminary reports suggest that one of the drivers may have lost control of their vehicle, veering

off the road and colliding with the oncoming vehicle.

The investigation into the circumstances surrounding the tragic incident is already underway.

In response to the collision, Acting MEC Busisiwe Shiba emphasised the critical importance of road safety measures and responsible driving practic-

"Motorists must always obey the rules," stated MEC Shiba, attributing many crashes to the attitude of drivers.

"Most of the crashes are avoidable, and mainly they are caused by the attitude of most motorists," she added.

MEC Shiba's plea serves as a stark reminder of the need for vigilance and adherence to road regulations to mitigate the risk of accidents on Mpumalanga's

"Obeying the rules is a key and non-negotiable requirement for every person who drives on our roads," she reiterated, underscoring the collective responsibility to ensure road safety for all.
