LIMPOPO LEGISLATURE TO HOST 2025 MEN'S PARLIAMENT

Tzaneen – The Limpopo Legislature is set to host the much-anticipated 2025 Men's Parliament, an event dedicated to promoting positive development among men and addressing key issues affecting them. The event will take place on Friday, 5 December 2025, starting at 10:00 AM at the Karibu Leisure Resort in Tzaneen, situated within the Mopani District. Under the empowering theme "Better men for tomorrow," the Men's Parliament seeks to engage men in meaningful dialogue and initiatives that encourage growth, responsibility, and leadership. This event underscores the Legislature's commitment to empowering men to become proactive contributors to their families and communities. Dr. Makoma Makurupje, Speaker of the Limpopo Legislature, spoke about the purpose of the Parliament during an interview on Timeless News' TikTok Live breakfast show. She explained, "The aim of this event is to provide men in our province with a platform to say, 'Not in our name,' to violence against women and children. It is also an opportunity

for men to review existing government policies and identify areas where interventions are required, as men face challenges just like women do. We must avoid painting all men with the same brush – there are many good men who also deserve protection." The event is expected to gather over 500 stakeholders, including representatives from municipalities and various civil society organizations such as the South African National Council for the Blind, South African Council of Churches, Human Rights Commission, Commission for Gender Equality, and the Limpopo Men Sector, among others. Dr. Makurupje also took the opportunity to remind motorists to drive safely during the festive season: "Let's drive carefully and adhere to speed limits on our roads. Let's spend our hard-earned money wisely. Above all, I wish everyone a Merry Christmas and a Prosperous New Year," she concluded. The 2025 Men's Parliament promises to be a significant step towards fostering societal responsibility and reinforcing the crucial role of men in building safer, more supportive communities.

MPUMALANGA LEGISLATURE LAUNCHES 16 DAYS OF ACTIVISM CAMPAIGN AGAINST GENDER-BASED VIOLENCE

Nkomazi – The Mpumalanga Provincial Legislature officially launched the 16 Days of Activism for No Violence Against Women and Children on Wednesday, 3 December 2025. The event took place at Block C Community Hall in Nkomazi Local Municipality under the Ehlanzeni District Council. Deputy Speaker Mr. Sam Masango, representing Speaker Ms. Makhosazane Masilela, led the programme, which was driven by the Select Committee on Women, Youth, Children, and People with Disabilities. Attendees included women and men representing various organisations. The day began with a community march followed by a session involving multiple stakeholders at the community hall. In his opening remarks, Mr. Jackson Malatjie, Chairperson of the Select Committee on Women, Youth, Children, and People with Disabilities, explained the Legislature's role in oversight and community engagement. "The Legislature has a mandate to oversee the executive and roll out programmes like the fight against Gender-Based Violence (GBV) and others," Malatjie said.

Ms. Hildah Nyambi, Speaker of Nkomazi Local Municipality, welcomed attendees and expressed the municipality's support for the campaign. She emphasized the urgency for collective action: "The time for rhetoric is over; everyone must play a role in combating GBV."

Deputy Speaker Sam Masango highlighted the event's significance as the official launch of the 16 Days of Activism campaign. He stressed that the fight against violence should extend throughout the year. "Today, we woke up to news that a husband stabbed his wife to death here in Nkomazi," Masango said. "GBV happens indiscriminately and must be reported and fought at all costs." He also called for dialogue with boys to educate them on the devastating impact of GBV, while urging communities to address contributing

factors such as tavern culture and alcohol abuse.

Ms. Ester Maphanga, a GBV survivor and current activist at the Asisukumeni Shelter in Tonga, shared her harrowing experience. She described enduring severe abuse from her spouse in front of their children, hoping he would provide for them despite the violence. Maphanga revealed the frustrations of the justice system, stating, "When I reported him, he would be arrested and released the next day without proper explanation. Women are suffering because they need to be fed." She appealed to law enforcement authorities to take stronger action against GBV.

Mr. Mandla Madonsela, representing the Men's Fora and Nkomazi Men's Sector, condemned the woman's killing reported that morning. He challenged men who buy liquor for women not to exploit them and urged tavern owners to take responsibility for their establishments. He also encouraged men to proactively check their health status.

Ms. Sasekani Manzini, Mpumalanga MEC for Health, conveyed the provincial government's strong commitment to combating GBV. "GBV, starting at an early age, has rippling effects as people grow older," she stated. Manzini called on teachers and faith leaders to incorporate child care and protection in their programmes, reminding the audience of the spirit of Ubuntu — that a community is responsible for raising every child. She also addressed gender dynamics, noting the importance of respecting women in leadership roles and raising boys and girls as equals. "Educated women should not be seen as a threat to men; both should treat each other with dignity and respect," Manzini said. She praised Premier Mandla Ndlovu for establishing the country's first Gender-Based Council and thanked the Legislature for intensifying the fight against GBV. Commissioner Erica Mogane of the Commission for Gender Equality expressed gratitude to the provincial leadership for their commitment. She stressed the importance of collaboration

in addressing GBV and cautioned against misconceptions about gender roles. "The rise of a woman does not mean the fall of a man," Mogane emphasized. She drew attention to the concerning trend of GBV case withdrawals in Mpumalanga and highlighted cases involving victims as young as ten years old. The Commissioner warned against the exploitation of vulnerable individuals by some leaders, including teachers and faith-based figures. She also noted that Emalahleni ranks among the top three areas in the country for assaults against men and urged men to report abuse anonymously. Mogane addressed the disturbing 'Amavuso' phenomenon—false rape claims made the day after consensual encounters—and

the increasing pattern of young women targeting older men for material gain, both of which undermine efforts to fight real cases of GBV. She concluded by appealing to everyone to take responsibility for reporting all incidents of GBV, no matter how small. Ward Councillor Mr. Ngomane thanked attendees, wished them a safe journey home, and highlighted the increasing abuse men face, calling for society to give this issue the attention it deserves. The launch marks a critical step in mobilising civil society, government, and communities to intensify the fight against gender-based violence across Mpumalanga and beyond.

TYME GROUP RAMPS UP GLOBAL EXPANSION WITH MAJOR NEW VISA PARTNERSHIP

South Africa – The Tyme Group, parent company of TymeBank, has signed a major multi-year, multi-market partnership with Visa that will strengthen its presence across South Africa, the Philippines and Vietnam. The agreement marks a significant step in the group's international growth strategy as it aims to drive financial inclusion and digital payment innovation in key emerging markets. TymeBank, launched in 2019, is South Africa's first fully digital bank to become profitable. The bank now holds R7 billion in customer deposits, operates 1,000 kiosks and 15,000 retail points, and serves 11 million customers — making it the country's third-largest bank by customer base. Although founded in South Africa, the Tyme Group moved its headquarters to Singapore and has expanded rapidly across Asia. It entered the Philippines in 2022 and runs its technology and product development hub in Vietnam, where it plans to launch a new bank. Across all operations, the group now serves 20 million customers.

The new partnership with Visa will support Tyme Group's expansion in all three markets. Visa will provide enhanced card-issuance programmes, marketing support, product development expertise, infrastructure improvements and data-driven financial services. The goal is to deliver secure, seamless and innovative payment solutions to more consumers and small businesses.

Lineshree Moodley, Visa's Country Manager for South Africa, said the deal underscores a shared mission.

"This partnership reflects our ambition

to accelerate digital adoption, broaden financial inclusion and bring innovative, low-cost banking solutions to millions. We're making digital payments more inclusive, secure and effortless for all South Africans."

Tyme Group CEO Coenraad Jonker added that the partnership marks an important milestone in the company's journey. "We're excited to deepen our impact in South Africa, the Philippines and Vietnam, empowering consumers and small businesses through secure, accessible and innovative payment experiences." The bank is also preparing for major changes in the coming years. In the first half of 2026, TymeBank will rebrand to GoTyme, aligning with the group's brand in the Philippines. South African customers will soon be able to apply for Smart IDs and passports at TymeBank kiosks, following the bank's integration into Home Affairs' expanded digital service rollout. Leadership changes are also on the horizon. Chief Commercial Officer Cheslyn Jacobs will take over as CEO in 2026, replacing Karl Westvig, who will transition into an advisory role. The Prudential Authority has already approved Jacobs' appointment. A long-time member of the Tyme team, Jacobs joined in 2012 and played a central role in building the bank's sales, distribution and customer service operations.

The Tyme Group's latest partnership with Visa signals its commitment to scaling world-class digital banking across multiple continents — and further strengthens its position as a fast-growing player in global financial services.

THE INTERGENERATIONAL BRIDGE: MENTORSHIP AS A COMMUNITY FOUNDATION

This week on **Timeless Beauty with Brains**, we had the privilege of speaking with Suraya Hamdulay, Corporate Affairs Director at Mars Southern Africa. Progress rarely follows a linear path; instead, it weaves together past experiences with emerging energies, connecting lessons learned to fresh ideas. Mentorship serves as the essential bridge enabling young people to understand their roots, envision future possibilities, and evolve into leaders who prioritize service over status. It fosters a culture where success is measured by lives uplifted, knowledge shared, and communities strengthened.

Mentorship transcends mere guidance—it becomes a foundation for collective growth. It is a living legacy that equips each generation to navigate challenges, seize opportunities, and create lasting impact. Melanie Le writes:

Melanie Le (ML): Why is mentorship a cornerstone for building thriving, resilient communities?

Suraya Hamdulay (SH): Mentorship broadens young people's horizons by connecting lived experience with ambition. It provides guidance that transforms potential into meaningful action. At Mars, investing in mentorship cultivates confidence, shared responsibility, and practical problem-solving skills. This approach not only enhances individual capability but also fortifies the long-term resilience of communities. Through mentorship, intergenerational dialogue flourishes, enabling the transmission and adaptation of knowledge, values, and lessons across time. ML: How did the guidance you received shape your perspective on leadership?

SH: Coaching offers structured reflection, increases self-awareness, and equips young people with practical tools to clarify their goals. It helps them identify strengths, understand their responses under pressure, and make deliberate, informed decisions. At Mars, coaching channels potential into concrete plans, empowering emerging leaders to navigate complexity with purpose, resilience, and adaptability. Coaching bridges intention with action, enabling young people to translate vision into measurable outcomes.

ML: How can organizations create better pathways for young talent to stay and thrive?

SH: The key is to make staying synonymous with opportunity. Structured mentorship programs, leadership development initiatives, expanded access to skills, and creating spaces where young people have a voice in decision-making all contribute to a sense of belonging. At Mars, this holistic approach retains talent by demonstrating that their contributions are valued and that meaningful growth—both professional and personal—is attainable locally. ML: What should leaders commit to in 2026 when it comes to mentorship?

Polokwane – Polokwane Municipality is set to host the third edition of the Carling Knockout Cup, which replaced the Telekom Knockout Cup for the 2023/2024 season. The much-anticipated final promises a classic “Goliath versus David” battle as Orlando Pirates, enjoying a rich vein of form and leading the Betway Premiership, take on the determined Marumo Gallants. On paper, Orlando Pirates are the favourites given their current dominance. However, Marumo Gallants should not

be underestimated. They have earned their place in the final decisively, having thrashed notable teams such as Golden Arrows, Mamelodi Sundowns, and Stellenbosch along the way. Marumo Gallants’ head coach Alexandre Lafitte expressed his excitement ahead of the final: “For me, I’m very excited and very happy to play this final, but honestly, I’m focused and concentrated on helping the club and team to win the trophy. It is a very important moment for me, the team, and the club. For that, I want to respect Marumo Gallants on Saturday, and I hope we will win the trophy,” Lafitte said, as quoted by SABC Sport. Orlando Pirates’

head coach Abdeslam Ouaddou reflected on his journey since taking charge of the team: “All these people are helping me to reach targets. Given that it’s been a hectic schedule full of thrills and spills, especially after Pirates crashed out of the CAF Champions League group-stage qualifiers, I think there’ll be time at the end of the season to judge the campaign better,” Ouaddou said, as reported by IOL ahead of the Carling Knockout final against Marumo Gallants. The match is scheduled for Saturday at 6 pm at the New Peter Mokaba Stadium. The Executive Mayor of Polokwane Municipality, Mokoro John Mpe, highlighted the economic benefits of hosting high-

profile football events: “We have traveled a journey with the Carling Knockout Cup. On 6 January 2024, we hosted a successful Carling Black Label Cup Allstars, the first of its kind. That event served as a precursor to the final we are hosting on Saturday. Sports is one of our key economic contributors, drawing visitors, creating jobs, and stimulating local markets,” said Mayor Mpe. As the excitement builds, football fans from across the region are eagerly awaiting a thrilling encounter that promises both sporting excellence and positive economic impact for the host city.

MPUMALANGA RANKS SECOND-HIGHEST HIV RATE

Nkomazi – The Mpumalanga Provincial AIDS Council (MPAC) held its quarterly meeting today at the Mzinti Community Hall in the Nkomazi Local Municipality. Co-chaired by Premier Mandla Ndlovu (government) and Ms Sonto Nkosi (Provincial Civil Society), the meeting brought together district officials, NGOs, health workers and people living with HIV to assess the province’s multisectoral response to HIV, TB and STIs. MPAC functions as the provincial hub that aligns the National Strategic Plan (NSP) with the Provincial Implementation Plan (PIP). Its mandate is to review district performance every three months and keep all stakeholders accountable. With Mpumalanga now ranking second-highest in the country for HIV prevalence — Premier Ndlovu cited a current figure of 16.4% — pressure is mounting to strengthen prevention strategies and improve treatment outcomes.

Key numbers driving the urgency

Mpumalanga’s overall HIV prevalence stood at 17.4% in 2022, equal to roughly 890 000 people living with HIV. Among adults aged 25–49, prevalence climbs to 26.4% — with women at 31.9% and men at 19.9%. Adolescent boys (15–24) carry a 1.5-times

higher prevalence (9.8%) than girls (6.3%). Antiretroviral treatment (ART) coverage rose from 65.4% in 2017 to 81.8% in 2022, yet only 56.4% of youth aged 15–24 are on ART.

Premier Ndlovu warned, “We need to accelerate our efforts in order to achieve the global 95-95-95 targets and end these health threats by 2030.” He added that government is expanding free HIV testing and will actively mobilise those who test positive to begin treatment without delay. Ms Nkosi, speaking on behalf of civil society, stressed the importance of ensuring people living with HIV remain at the centre of decision-making. “We must utilise conditional donor funds solely for the fight against HIV and TB. Failure to spend them will impact negatively on our quest to mitigate stigma and discrimination,” she said. She urged the province to prioritise men-friendly health services and encouraged men to “personally test and know their status.”

Mpumalanga will host its Provincial World AIDS Day commemoration on Friday at Kamhlushwa Stadium under the theme “Renewed efforts and sustainable commitments to end AIDS.” The event will include free HIV testing, TB screening and other integrated health services, reinforcing the province’s drive toward achieving the UNAIDS 2030 95-95-95 goals.

LIMPOPO UNVEILS 105 NEW ROADWORK MACHINES IN MAJOR SERVICE DELIVERY PUSH

Limpopo – Premier Dr Phophi Ramathuba and Public Works, Roads and Infrastructure MEC Ernest Rachoene on Thursday unveiled a brand-new fleet of 105 yellow and white vehicles at the Old Peter Mokaba Stadium in Polokwane. The convoy includes graders, dozers, front-end loaders, tipper trucks, trailers, minibuses and double-cab bakkies — all earmarked for the province’s road-grading programme. “A fleet only becomes meaningful when it turns into action,” Ramathuba told the crowd. “Once these vehicles leave here today, their impact must be felt immediately. Roads that have long deteriorated must begin to show progress.” Rachoene said the new machines will give a major boost to the internal Dikgerekere programme, which uses provincial employees to upgrade roads and infrastructure. “This will go a long way in capacitating our cost centres and ensuring improved service delivery. The work of Dikgerekere Wednesdays will be accelerated,” he said, also expressing appreciation for the Seventh Administration

under Ramathuba’s leadership. The launch forms part of an ongoing effort to strengthen service delivery. Earlier this year, the province announced the appointment of 140 new officials, building on a series of recruitments totalling 590 staff since December 2024.

The new fleet also expands on the previous rollout of 251 yellow machines in December 2024, which included front loaders, graders and concrete mixers already put to work on gravel roads across the province.

Deputy Minister of Defence Bantu Holomisa praised the initiative, calling the revival of the “yellow fleet” a significant step toward enhancing road infrastructure and urging other provinces to follow suit. With the addition of these machines, the Department of Public Works aims to double the output of its existing fleet of over 500 vehicles, fast-tracking the blading, regravelling and clearing of long-neglected road reserves.

The yellow fleet is expected to hit the gravel this week, with residents set to see freshly graded surfaces on some of Limpopo’s most worn-out routes very soon.







CRY, THE BELOVED COUNTRY: PATON'S TIMELESS ECHO OF SOUTH AFRICA'S SOUL

Alan Paton's *Cry, the Beloved Country* remains a cornerstone of South African literature. The novel follows Reverend Stephen Kumalo, a humble pastor from the rural hills of Ixopo, as he travels to the sprawling, perilous streets of Johannesburg in search of his son, Absalom. Along the way, Paton paints a vivid portrait of a nation caught between tradition and modernity, love and fear, justice and injustice. The opening chapter introduces the "lovely road" that winds into the hills—a symbol of the sacred earth that sustains the people but suffers deeply when exploited. In Chapter 7, Kumalo meets his brother John in Johannesburg, and their tense conversation highlights the clash between old-world values and a new, more cynical urban mindset. It is here that Paton writes, "I see only one hope for our country... when white men and black men... come together to work for it." Chapter 9 delivers the shocking murder of Arthur Jarvis, a turning point that forces both Kumalo and the reader to confront the brutal reality of racial violence. Throughout the novel, Paton's prose remains lyrical yet grounded, transforming the South African landscape into a character in its own right. His memorable lines linger long after the final page:

"Sorrow is better than fear. Fear is a journey, a terrible journey, but sorrow is at least an arriving."

"The tragedy is not that things are broken. The tragedy is that things are not mended again."

"For who can stop the heart from breaking?" "When the storm threatens, a man is afraid for his house. But when the house is destroyed, there is something to do."

These passages capture Paton's belief that pain, while inevitable, can lead to deeper

understanding and, ultimately, healing.

Paton's themes—family, redemption, and the moral cost of oppression—remain as urgent today as they were more than seventy years ago. The novel's plea for reconciliation and shared humanity echoes in contemporary conversations about social justice across the world. 

Bafana Bafana will face a sterner test in Group B in the AFCON tourney when they will be competing against Egypt, Angola, and Zimbabwe.

Broos' charges will open their campaign when they play their first match of the continental tournament against Angola on December 22.
